Thanks, Paul, for a lesson we all should learn

Immediate family and perhaps Jimmy Cipriani not included, I think I will miss Paul Howe more than anyone on the Islands.

Paul was a devoted husband to Harriet, and that she will miss him terribly needs no explanation. Cipriani was perhaps Paul's closest friend of the past few years. The two enjoyed each other's company immensely, whether they were taking a "road trip" into town for lunch at the Snack House, blazng a new nature trail behind Cipriani's house, or shooting a game of pool in his family room. Cipriani will no doubt miss his good friend.

But what about me? Why should a busy young woman miss a 78-year-old, self-proclaimed (and rightfully so) curmudgeon whose legal briefs and "FYI" memos deluged my desk on a regular basis and whose letters to the editor often exceeded even the most liberal standards for length and frequency of submission?

Because Paul was my good friend, too. He was one of the first people I met when I came to Sanibel. And he made it his business to squire me around, introducing me with grace and flair to those he thought I should know.

He was the first person who took me through the J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge. It was a trip we would take many times together, each time armed with binoculars and many times prepared to walk for what seemed like miles off the beaten path.

And I think I was one of the few people with whom he shared his favorite "Friday Afternoon Safari." We would start with a trip through the refuge. Then we would head to Captiva, stopping at Tween Waters Inn to visit Millie and have a

beer. Then we would lunch at the Mucky Duck. (We spent two of Paul's last three birthdays at the restaurant on the gulf, where we split a piece of key lime pie after Paul graciously received a standing ovation and a hearty round of "Happy Birthday" from the entire clientele. For his 78th birthday this past Jan. 24 we celebrated closer to home, at the Coconut Grove, where Linda served French fries decorated with candles because she knew Paul did not eat sweets.) "Safari" continued with one more beer at Chadwick's, then perhaps a stop at the Captiva Post Office or maybe at Sarita Van Vleck's house on the way back to Sanibel.

Because my afternoon would be shot after "safari," however, I had to turn Paul down the last few times he extended an invitation. We did, however, continue our fairly frequent lunches at the "Utting Pelican, where Paul would delight in seeing many of his long-time Island friends. ("Who told them about it?" he demanded in fine curmudgeon fashion when a group of tourists invaded the restaurant that Paul would have much rather kept a strictly "local" secret.)

Despite his somewhat caustic approach on occasion and his often laborious lessons about articles,

and whether we agreed with him or not, we appreciated his input. He was a 'curmudgeon extraordinaire.'"

chapters and statutes, Paul imparted something to me that was well worth whatever inconvenience I had to suffer (neither "inconvenience" nor "suffer" is entirely accurate here, because I never really felt imposed upon).

He taught me that growing old does not have to coincide with growing bored, and that a person has no one to blame but himself when he complains of nothing to do.

Paul knew no such thing as a lack of interest in something. He was curious about everything, and he was tireless in his efforts to learn as much as he could about whatever was at hand. And he was equally enthusiastic about sharing his knowledge with others (a bit too enthusiastic, I'm sure the City Council and other well-meaning parties with whom Paul sometimes clashed will maintain).

But what our friendship boiled down to, I think, was a mutual dislike for anyone who depends on others for fulfillment or even for amusement.

"Use your own resources," Paul often told me. "When it comes right down to it, you're on your own. And you only go around once, so you'd better make it good this time."

And although he was in his glory when holding court with an audience of attentive listeners, Paul was just as comfortable walking alone on the beach, pounding out another diatribe to a public servant, or sifting through the plastic washtub full of shells just inside his garage door. (On every beach walk he gathered a handful of shells to deposit in the tub when he got home. Then when the tub was filled, he would give the shells away.)

Thanks, Paul. Would that we all took such delight in such simple things.

SPECIES: PREPOSTERI (commonly known as Preppy)

Classification: Noxious only when awake. Identifiable traits: The female of the species is called Buffy; the male is Toby. They wear OP shirts, deck shoes and Izod sweaters tied around their necks. (Unfortunately, the latter does little to muffle the bothersome high-pitched noise they emit.) Toby drinks Lite beer. Buffy drinks Diet Coke or Cape Codders in tiny sips to last until someone offers to buy her another. Travel in gaggles; incessant giggling. Crowded nesting habits.

Preppy uses a strange interspecies communication form. "What's your major?" "daddy" (as in "daddy's condo" and "daddy's VISA") and "cheapest" (as in "what's your cheapest beer? room?" etc.) are the most frequently heard sounds coming from their mouths. Let me discuss several of the points brought up in both letters:

●1. The "extensive sampling program" cited by Zeiss consisted of tests conducted in 1975, 1979 and 1981. No subsequent tests took place until I raised the subject again in 1986, when a test (negative) was made after and because of my inquiry.

●2. Zeiss says, "All (tests) were found to be negative." Not true! Tests in 1975 produced "small amounts of asbestos fiber." Come on, Ralph, don't knee jerk. Don't shoot aimlessly from the hip.

Zeiss questioned my timing. He needn't. I explained it carefully. I suggest he read the article. It was carefully researched, and aid was extended to me by former IWA leaders and employees as well as by pre-

sent manager Bob Hollander and IWA engineer Richard Derowitsch. Both installments of my article were read to Hollander and Derowitsch before they were published. Their comments were duly considered and were, in some cases, incorporated in the text.

Zeiss says I present no data to support my concern. There is not much meat in that baloney. I cite the Environmental Protection Agency's ban of asbestos. EPA Director Lou Thomas says, "There can be no debate about health risks of asbestos." Come on, Ralph, wake up and smell the coffee!

"Inflammatory journalism," my foot! Do you suppose the EPA would ban the material if it were safe? Zeiss also ignores my examples of Wisconsin and

New York towns that are battling asbestos contamination in their water supplies. No data to support? Nonsense. Those two cases are extensively studied and reported by the EPA.

Regarding the calcium carbonate coating in our new pipes, it does not exist. It is a phantom coating. EPA studied zinc coating in Wisconsin and found it ineffective, too. IWA still employs the zinc method.

Robson suggests it to be unfortunate that my articles were "printed before the facts." No so! I dug out lots of data and then, and only then, raised some questions about the desirability of having 24.5 miles of asbestos-cement pipe on our two Islands

I would have to question that humane euthanasia is used on greyhounds, as recommended by the Humane Society.

Society of the United States. But if that were true, it's progress. One of the previous methods (still employed, I'm told) is shooting. It appears that some "used" dogs are sent to research labs, a cause in itself to soundly castigate the whole dog racing industry.

HSUS officials were present when the film promoting artificial lures was shown, and they contend that, "In spite of efforts currently being made in limited quarters, at least 90 percent of greyhound trainers say live lures are necessary..." Conservative estimates say the number of animals injured and killed as lures is around 100,000. Florida might have a law on its books prohibiting this, but it's unenforced and being fought strongly by animal trainers. Recent inquiries inform me that jack rabbits are still imported

to the land of sunshine for greyhound bait.

Breeders know from the start that they are producing surplus animals, a deliberate act deemed, at the least, irresponsible by Humane Societies and other concerned groups nationwide. 50 percent of these dogs never even make it to a real track, and 80 percent die before the age of 4 or 5 years. What a tragic waste of life!

Another extreme concern is the high percentage of injuries to the greyhounds, an unnecessary cruelty imposed on the dogs who, unlike human athletes, have no choice in the matter.

And please spare me that, "They run and chase by instinct." So do other canine breeds. That kind of logic says pit bulls are born to fight so let's put them in the

arena (but that's another sad story).

Yes, greyhound racing is big business. But in spite of Florida having the largest number of tracks in the country, this money comprises less than 1 percent of all state revenue.

The whole system of dog racing today is rampant with animal abuse, and no person of knowledge or conscience should tolerate it. I know of no animal concerned group, local or national, that condones it. It's always interesting, however, to see the camouflage of cruelty in articles written by the exploiters in order to justify their abuses.

At that time, a group of Islanders headed by Bob Haynie realized the need for a responsible financial institution on the Islands. 40,000 shares of stock were offered at par value, and 280 subscribers (mostly Sanibel and Captiva residents) paid \$20 per share to raise \$800,000 of capital.

Haynie says raising the money was the easy part. The paperwork, on the other hand, seemed endless. But on Dec. 17, 1974, the Bank of the Islands opened its doors.

Islanders responded enthusiastically. In the first week more than 350 customers made deposits exceeding \$500,000. The fledgling bank was on its way.

Today more than 70 bank employees work in two offices on Sanibel and in branches on Captiva, Pine Island and in Fort Myers.

In those early days the bank had only 14 employees who occupied the single office on Periwinkle Way. But as the Island grew, so did the bank. Today more than 70 bank employees work in two offices on Sanibel, and in offices on Captiva, Pine Island and in Fort Myers. Deposits have grown from \$500,000 to more than \$95 million with some \$57 million in outstanding loans.

Bank of the Islands has also become an integral part of the Island community. It has supported projects that were necessary to the growing Island. Loans with favorable interest rates were made available to Care and Rehabilitation of Wildlife, the Sanibel Recreation Complex, the Sanibel Community Association, many of the Islands' churches, the Chamber of Commerce and to the city of Sanibel for its new City Hall complex. In addition, the bank has made contributions in excess of \$30,000 to worthy organizations, including the Children's Center of the Island, the Sanibel-Captiva Conservation Foundation, Project Outreach and Barrier Island Group for the Arts.

The dream of Haynie and those early subscribers has been realized, but Jim Lowman, president of Bank of the Islands, says there is more to come.

"We can offer our customers all of the convenience, all of the services, all of the interest points that the larger banks can. And we can do all of that in a hometown way that's important to our customers. There are going to be a lot more changes, and we're probably prepared better than most to take advantage of them."



City Council will not reconsider private road maintenance policy

Last week the City Council declined to reconsider its current policy not to use public funds to maintain private roads in Sanibel subdivisions.

Elmer Stilbert, president of the Committee of Neighborhoods Associations, and Henry Shelton, chairman of the Better Government Association of the Islands, made the request during the public comment segment of last Tuesday's council meeting.

Stilbert and Shelton said it had been brought to their attention that the city had signed a contract with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service to grade the five-mile Wildlife Drive through the J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge and the northern stretch of Tarpon Bay Road between Sanibel-Captiva Road and the bay once a month. The agreement extends for 10 months, ending this August, for which the city is paid \$200 a month.

The city has also signed an agreement with Lee County to grade when needed a 100-foot strip of a public street on Captiva.

It is not fair to Sanibel taxpayers if the city will not provide them the same service, Shelton charged. "I'd like to have the city grade the streets in my subdivision (Gulf Pines) on the same basis," he added.

City Manager Gary Price said the roads in question (the Wildlife Drive, Tarpon Bay Road and the Captiva street) are public roads, not privately owned, as are those in many subdivisions. "We can't use public funds to maintain private property," he pointed out.

"We consider it a cooperative effort with other governmental entities with mutual advantages," he said about the city's agreement regarding the other streets.

The city has been grading the roads for the wildlife refuge on and off for the past eight years, Price said.

In return the refuge is actively participating in Sanibel's emergency management program and cooperates with the city in other projects.

The county pays the city for grading the road on Captiva and among other things inspects bridges on the Island at no cost, he explained.

But Shelton maintained Sanibel residents get very little from the county for their tax dollars.

State law requires that interlocal agreements be-

between governmental agencies must be to mutual advantage, Shelton said. "What advantage is there to Sanibel from maintaining roads in the Ding Darling refuge and on Captiva?" he asked.

He maintained that by doing this the city is violating the state statute. Councilman Fred Valtin said the question of using city equipment to maintain private roads in subdivisions was thoroughly discussed during hearings on the new Land Development Code.

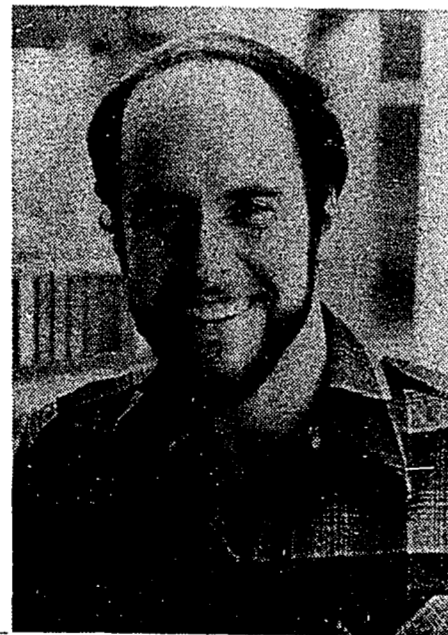
"The decision was made not to maintain private roads," he said. "The city will take over maintenance when the streets are rebuilt to city standards and dedicated to the city."

"I'm not willing to reopen the matter," he said. Councilman Mike Klein said he had not changed his mind about that policy decision.

Nor were the other three council members in favor of placing the issue on a future council agenda.

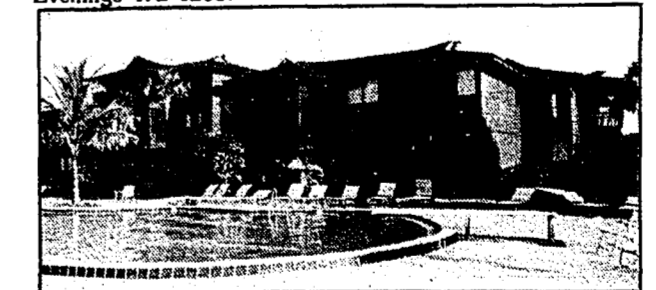

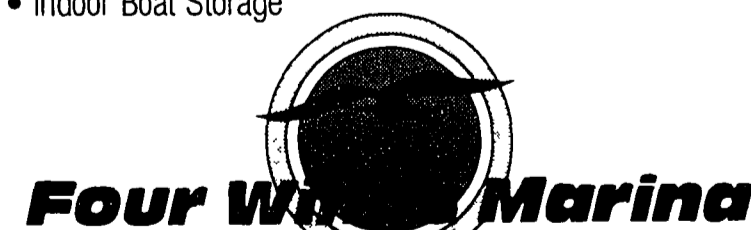

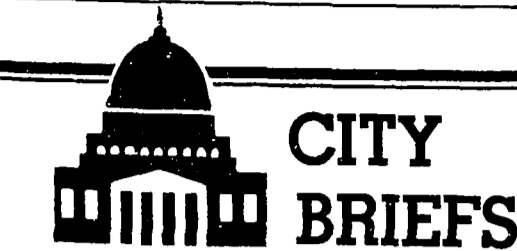

Florida Attorney General Jim Smith has declined to issue a formal opinion as to whether DESIGNATING SOME OF THE PARKING SPACES AT GULFSIDE CITY PARK FOR "RESIDENTS ONLY" would violate the city's agreement with the state Department of Natural Resources for use of the beach park.

In a letter to City Attorney David La Croix, Smith said that under state law he was not authorized to issue legal opinions on questions of interpretation of local codes, ordinances, charters and agreements.

The City Council asked for an outside opinion after Elmer Stilbert, president of the Committee of Neighborhoods Association, disagreed with La Croix's



interpretation that under the terms of the grant from DNR for the park it would be discriminatory to restrict parking on the basis of residency.

Some time ago CONA asked the City Council to consider designating some of the 30 parking spaces at the city-owned gulfside park for Island residents only. Stilbert told the council that many days the parking lot is filled with day-trippers, leaving Islanders no place to park.

To try and resolve these differences the council directed La Croix to seek an opinion from the state attorney general.

Last Tuesday the council followed La Croix's suggestion to ask the chief counsel for the DNR whether any form of restricted parking at Gulfside City Park would be contrary to the terms of the city's agreement with the state agency.

La Croix said he would be even more specific and get a determination on whether the parking area is considered part of the overall recreational facility and whether restricting parking to property owners would be considered discriminatory.

MENT CODE recommended for approval by the Planning Commission were granted by the City Council last Tuesday.

At a hearing Jan. 28 the commission had determined none of the applications could comply with all of the seven criteria needed for approval. But because merit for approval was found in all four they were forwarded to the council for further consideration.

Using broader guidelines the council voted 5-0 to permit Richard and Karen Kraft to keep a wall (part of a swimming pool enclosure) that is only 18 feet from a canal.

The council also voted 5-0 to allow restrooms required at the Periwinkle Pines subdivision "common

pool area" to be built below the base flood level.

An amendment to LDC flood proofing regulations is in the works to permit poolside restrooms in common recreational areas in residential developments to be constructed on the ground. But City Attorney David La Croix said that rather than delay completion of the Periwinkle Pines amenity until the amendment is adopted, it would be appropriate for the council to consider Letendre's request for a variance on its own merits.

Ray and Debbie Pavelka's request for a variance for a swimming pool and deck that encroaches 15 feet into the setback from Anchor Drive and is only 14 feet from the Sanibel River was approved by a 4-1 vote.

Mayor Louise Johnson dissented on the basis that there was room on the lot to relocate the pool to comply with required setbacks. Her four colleagues could see no harm to either the neighborhood or to the community in allowing the encroachments.

Matt Asen also won 4-1 approval of variances needed to permit a 120-square-foot walk-in cooler at the rear of the Timbers restaurant. The addition exceeds the permitted floor area ratio of the Timbers Court complex as well as the developed area and off-street parking and loading requirements of the LDC.

With Councilman Mike Klein dissenting the council

approved the addition with the conditions that the cooler be concealed by a fence that would be removed when the cooler is no longer in operation.

• **A REAL ESTATE OFFICE CAN OPERATE AT SUNDIAL RESORT** until February 1994, but business will be limited to resales of Sundial condominium units.

A special negotiating committee headed by Councilman Fred Valtin presented this solution to the dispute between the city and Marquis Hotels and Resorts, the owner of Sundial.

Last Tuesday the City Council unanimously accepted the proposed settlement of the disagreement as

to whether a real estate office could continue as a part of the commercial operation of the resort. The issue had dragged on for months.

The problem stemmed from the September 1977 negotiated settlement of Sundial's lawsuit against the city to determine the density for the complex.

In his report to the council Valtin said the agreement was ambiguous. It did not make it clear whether the real estate office was part of the existing commercial building on the site. The office use continued even though it did not comply with all provisions of the Comprehensive Land Use Plan.

The negotiating committee found it fair and reasonable to permit the office to continue for a

specified period of time with its activities limited to sale of Sundial units between 9 a.m. and 6 p.m. daily. The council voted 5-0 to amend the original Sundial settlement agreement to include these constraints for the real estate office.

Tarpon Bay Road and Casa Ybel Roads. But of those he identified only six appeared reasonable because of cost, location, access and configuration.

The City Council was disappointed last month when Price reported that the owner was not interested in selling a five-acre parcel directly east of City Hall. The city had hoped to acquire the land for expansion of its public works operation.

At that time Price was asked to look for alternative sites.

But the council last week preferred to continue to pursue acquisition of the five-acre tract — by condemnation if necessary — with the possibility of purchasing an additional 22.85-acre tract adjoining it further

east. Paul Betts owns the five-acre parcel that is assessed at \$45,190.

The 22.85 acres directly east of Periwinkle Pines subdivision has 200-foot frontage on Periwinkle way and is assessed at \$206,250.

Mayor Louise Johnson and Councilman Mike Klein saw possibilities in a third parcel that carries a more modest price tag. This 7.49-acre tract with 250-foot frontage on the north side of Periwinkle Way is across the street from the Pirate Playhouse.

Since compiling the list Price said he had discovered the owner of a 27.4-acre tract west of Sanibel Community Church with 1,200 feet of frontage on the north side of Periwinkle Way was not interested in selling. It

is assessed at \$201,140.

Price reminded the council that the assessed valuations are for tax purposes and 50 percent should be added to bring the prices up to market value.

The council shared Price's concern that with the amount of vacant land on the Island shrinking fast it behooved the city not to wait too long to look into acquiring additional land for its own future needs.

But the council agreed that more time was needed to investigate these possibilities before making a final decision. And Price said he would make sure there was no parcel he overlooked in his first survey.

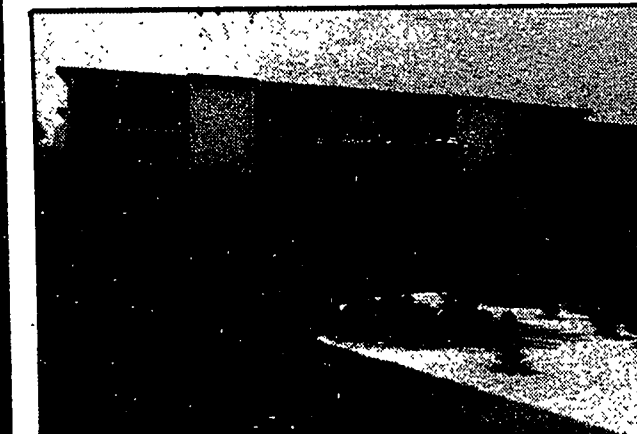

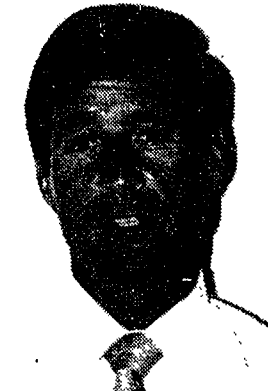

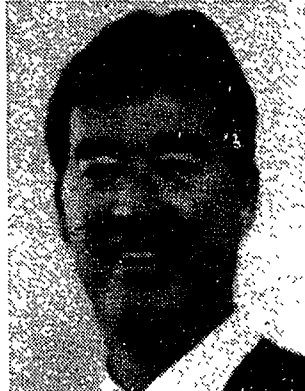

All six condominium units are sold in Sanibel's first office-only complex

Sanibel's designated "town center" in the Palm Ridge Road area continues to grow as one of the commercial and professional office hubs on the Island.

A new addition to the mix will be the Sanibel Professional Center, the Island's first "office-only" building complex. The developers expect the offices to

open by the end of the month.

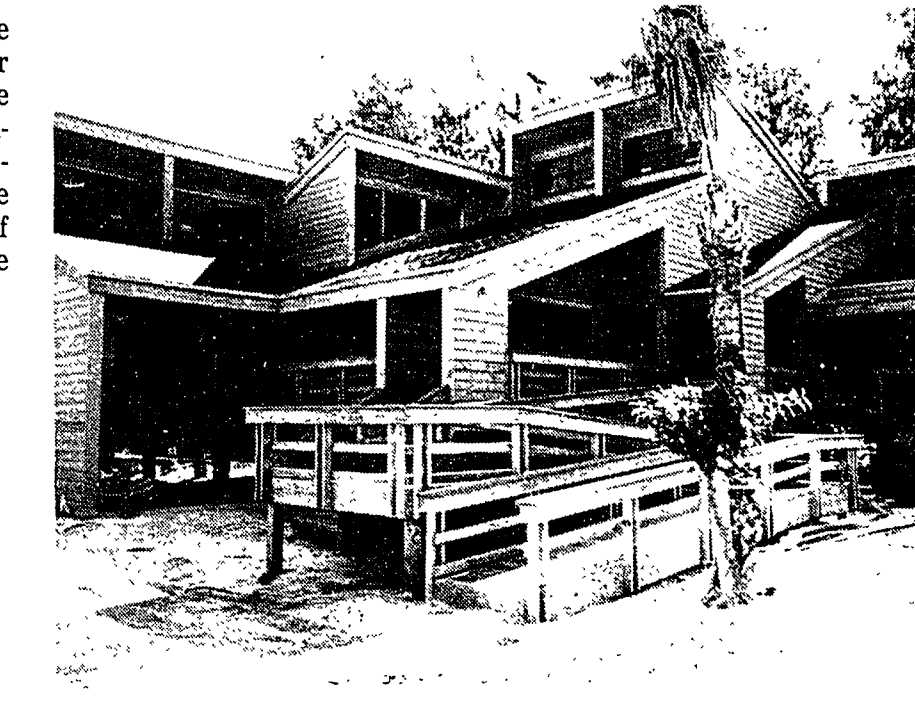
All six units have been sold. Four of the units are owned by the developers. Builder Good will use two offices; Wortzel, one; and Watson has bought one to lease out.

Feeding alligators anywhere is not only ILLEGAL, it is extremely DANGEROUS. An alligator that is accustomed to being fed will become a potentially dangerous animal if left unfed for a period of time. Animals that are not artificially fed are less likely to become problems. A "lame" alligator becomes bold - he loses his fear of man.

An alligator has difficulty distinguishing between a piece of fish and the hand that holds it.

Because of the gator population here dogs should never be allowed to run free on the islands. Fence your dog, walk him on a leash or, if you must free him for a walk, keep him under voice control. NEVER tie your dog in an unfenced backyard.

PLEASE DON'T FEED THE ALLIGATORS



As springtime approaches alligators will become more prominent members of our wildlife community.

It's not just a request.
 It's the law - one that is all too frequently broken

It is time once again to cite a practice that was rendered illegal years ago by the Sanibel City Council, whose initiative was later followed by the state of Florida. Both Sanibel city and Florida state laws declare it illegal to feed, entice or tame wild and free-roaming alligators.

But these laws are all too frequently broken. Fortunately, on Sanibel our citizens are somewhat more responsible and understanding than elsewhere in the state, and the law is respected by most residents here.

Peer pressure aids in enforcement of this law on the Island. There are hundreds of people who, if they see someone enticing or feeding an alligator, will remonstrate either to that person or to the police.

But many visitors ignore the strategically placed no-feed-um signs and feed alligators anyway, to the detriment of the animals and in defiance of the law.

The Southwest Florida Regional Alligator Association fostered this legislation and an educational program relative to the alligator. Among the more important points we teach and repeat yearly for new visitors and new

residents involves just why feeding alligators is illegal.

Have you ever wondered why the greatest concentration of alligators on Sanibel is in the pond at Bailey's shopping center? At most times there are upwards of two dozen fat, tame, still quite small alligators there. They are fed by people — mostly visitors or new arrivals. The alligators are conditioned to eat bread and lunch scraps of all kinds.

Even the plastic foam trays in which quick lunches are dispensed, smelling as they do of meat loaf or ribs, are bitten into pieces (but seldom swallowed) by the alligators. This exacerbates the Sanibel litter problem because this durable material seldom disappears but floats around the pond for months before becoming water-logged and sun-brittle enough to go away.

The tame alligators of Bailey's pond are small enough to be harmless today. But they are a foot longer now than they were a year ago, and next year they will add another foot. So a whole

bunch of future alligators problems is being created.

Most of these little fellows were hatched in late August or early September 1984 in a nest on what we still call the Sanibel River, which of course it is not. The nest was a few hundred yards southwest of Bailey's pond. Sometime in late 1984 or early 1985, as water receded in the Sanibel Slough (a better name for the "river"), these babies

moved northward to Bailey's pond. There they stayed and became tame and somewhat dependent on illegal handouts from misguided people.

In a couple of years, at about four feet, this junior class of alligators, taught to expect food from people, will — without fear — expect continued ration handouts.

About this time they will begin to disperse and seek broader horizons. Some will stay, but others will move to real estate lakes and ponds along condominium alley and will take their bad and potentially dangerous human-induced feeding habits with them.

Those who make their own rules can wiggle out of any charge by claiming the food thrown into the water was really intended for the fishes and birds.

Man has destroyed natural conditions on Sanibel and by doing so has created alligator habitat and uplands high enough for building lots. This was accomplished by dumping fill scooped out of manmade lakes. To my knowledge all of the bodies of water you see as you drive around the central part of the Island are manmade — and attractive to alligators. In such lakes, ponds and canals alligators are very conspicuous.

Every year there is a new infusion of folks from Ohio and elsewhere — folks who are not accustomed to finding alligators in their swimming pools or gardens. And every year we who concern ourselves with alligators are called out to solve the problems. Of course these problems are the harvest of unthinking people who chose not to observe our laws and just had to feed little alligators lunch scraps.

And every year a few dogs are killed by alligators. These victims are the dogs whose careless owners allow them to run free. A lot of people who should know better lose dogs to alligators.

Dogs have a long history of association with the human species. During this time they have lost a lot of their instinctive behavioral patterns that used

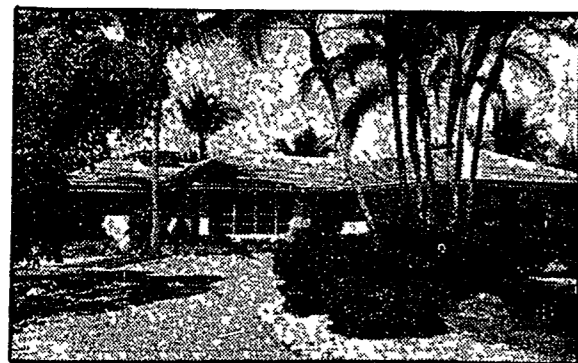

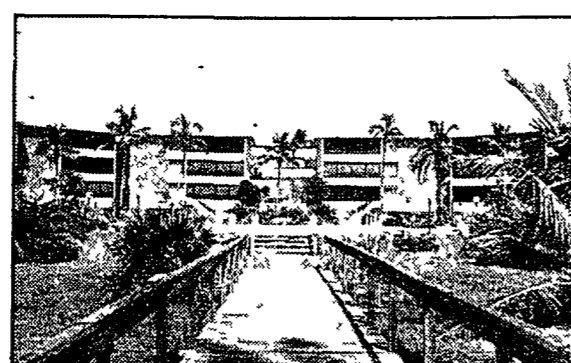

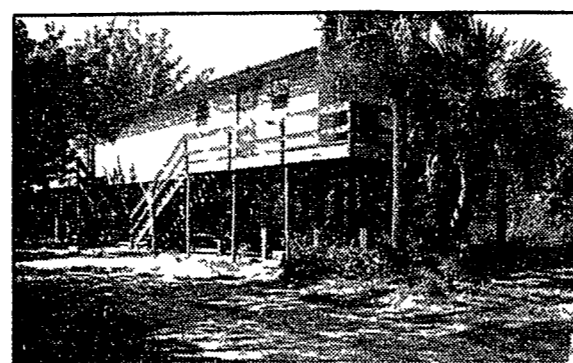

Picking up litter: It's a dirty job, but somebody has to do it

Eleven people showed up at our office with litter collected from the Island's beaches and roadsides last week. Most complained that the Island was generally a mess with litter. They blamed careless, lazy people who toss their refuse from cars and also rough seas that bring cans and bottles ashore.

Many people cleaned the busy east end of the Island; others picked up on Periwinkle Way, Island Inn Road and West Gulf Drive.

Marion Dean, of St. Louis and Sanibel concentrated on the east gulf area. "Most of the trash I saw had come in with the waves," Dean said. "People seem to be keeping the beach

pretty clean," she added. "I think the beaches are better than they usually are — probably because of The Islander program. It's pretty neat when people stop me on the beach and thank me for picking up."

Irene Claydon and Marie Bouquet said most of their haul was "old stuff that's been in the water."

Andrea Bean, here 10 days from Colorado, thought the beaches on the east end of the Island were "lousy" with litter. So she spent an hour picking up.

Jon Dahlke from Omaha, Neb., agreed that the beaches were pretty dirty. Among his litter collection was a crab trap with nails that could have been dangerous.

Betty Julivette of Hamilton, Ohio, spent more than two hours picking up litter along the West Gulf Drive beaches. One indicator that the litter she found had been recently discarded by beach-goers was the numerous plastic forks and spoons she discovered.

John and Pat Esworthy of Riverton, N.J., concentrated on Periwinkle Way. Over a two-week period they gathered numerous cans — enough for them to call the Island "very dirty."

Helen Cornelius said she thought the Island's beaches were in very good shape. "But if each person just stopped and picked up some litter we'd be in great shape," she added. "Good point! For the people who joined our anti-litter campaign last week — Thanks for Picking Up!"

Preservation of the environment serves to protect important wildlife

What do the American bald eagle, the Florida manatee, the loggerhead turtle and the Schaus swallowtail butterfly have in common? They all live in South Florida and they are all in danger of becoming extinct.

Florida has more endangered species than any other state except Hawaii. The wood stork is one of the newest members of the endangered species list established by Florida's Department of Natural Resources and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

Once the formal legal process is completed and a species is listed, a plan is made for helping the species

to recover.

The best method for overall preservation of the species is protection of its habitat. Habitat is a place that provides everything a creature needs to survive — i.e., food, shelter, water and space or territory. Habitat in South Florida is disappearing or being altered at a rapid rate.

The J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge is in the business of managing mangrove wetlands for

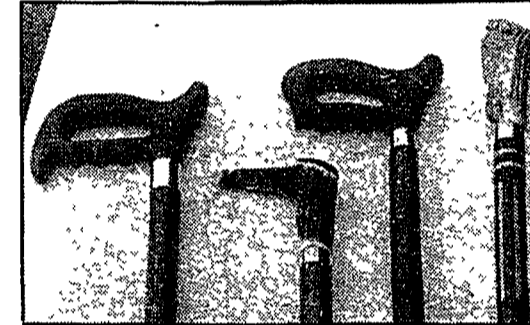
the benefit of migratory birds. The management efforts include eradicating exotic plants such as the Australian pine and Brazilian pepper. These exotics prohibit the growth of plants upon which native wildlife depends.

Purchasing and preserving wildlife habitat is the most subtle of the efforts. The wetlands are incredibly productive if permitted to exist and function. By preserving this ecosystem, the food, shelter and water needed by wading and shore birds such as the endangered wood stork is self-perpetuating.

The next time you visit the refuge on Sanibel don't

just look for birds and animals. Instead, look at where the animal lives. What does it eat? Where does it rest? How and where does it raise its young?

An animal does not exist alone; it has basic life requirements just as humans have needs. And to preserve animals it is necessary to preserve their habitat.

The refuge visitor center is at the refuge entrance just off Sanibel-Captiva Road. Information about wildlife observation and natural history is available through exhibits, slides and volunteer staff. The hours are 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday and 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday and Sunday.

March 16-22 is National Wildlife Week. The refuge will be offering two films, "The American Alligator" and "The Crocodile," Monday through Friday at 11 a.m., to call attention to two protected South Florida reptiles.

Visit the refuge and enjoy the outdoor recreation opportunities available there. Hiking, fishing, canoeing and wildlife observation are some of the activities in which you can participate.

The refuge is part of a system of public lands unparalleled anywhere in the world. It provides visitors a chance to enjoy one of South Florida's natural areas.

The valuable habitat preserved through the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's efforts provides a refuge for wildlife in a state where undisturbed lands are disappearing. These public lands might be the haven of last resort for the endangered species of Florida.

Right or left: which side of your brain dominates?

Feeling down? Can't come up with a solution to a particular problem? You might be handicapped because you are using only half of your brain.

While other countries are developing educational tactics that show an understanding of the brain and that also stimulate the use of the "whole brain," the United States lags far behind.

Laughing is one of the best ways to set both hemispheres of the brain working, believes Dr. Gabe

Campbell.

Campbell certainly used that tactic last week in two hands-on workshops called "The Development of Creative Intelligence." He often had his audience of more than 100 people at the Sanibel Congregation United Church of Christ laughing with abandon as they performed "whole brain" exercises and games.

Campbell, a minister with the First Congregational United Church of Christ in Akron, Ohio, earned his doctorate degree after writing a dissertation on the changes that occur in the brain during meditation and prayer. He has since become a nationally-known ex-

pert in the field of right brain/left brain learning.

"Here's a useful little test to show you which side of your brain dominates," he told the group. He said several words and instructed the audience to spell them with him. When he said "of" he spelled it "o-v" and tried to continue. But several voices from the audience interrupted him.

"You are the left-brainers — you are the logical, sequential people who look for mistakes," Campbell laughed. "Those of you who went ahead with the 'o-v'"

are right-brainers and see things in pictures — you flowed with it."

Generally, the left brain deals with the logical, verbal and analytical. And the right brain deals with the artistic or musical. The left brain might tell you how many coins you have in your pocket, but the right brain gives you a picture of what they are, Campbell explained.

Many of the exercises and games at the workshops forced people to achieve a balance between the two hemispheres of the brain.

"We've got to get over our pure linear logical thinking," Campbell said, adding this kind of thinking is generally a product of a dominant, logical, left side of the brain.

An example of linear logical thinking occurs in teaching reading. Educators in America seem to be trying to force reading on younger and younger children, believing those children will have a head start.

But these almost "pre-natal" attempts to teach reading are not sensible, Campbell believes. Nor are the conclusions some educators have that a person must have a learning disability if he cannot learn to read.

"Reading and writing have no bearing on intelligence... it's often the Einstein types who tend not to read until very late," Campbell said. "The people who are fast thinking, whole brained, cannot slow their brains down enough to read left to right."

Campbell hopes America will follow the pattern of education in Denmark, where reading is not introduced until the children are 7 years old. By then, Campbell believes, the young students' brains have developed enough to more easily handle reading.

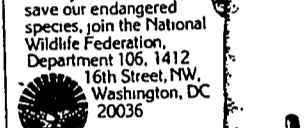

have adopted appropriate educational methods.

enmark, for instance, has gotten "instruments of torture and non-torture" — chairs — in kindergarten

classes.

Campbell asked a volunteer from the audience to stand and stick out his arm. When he applied pressure to the arm, he tried to push it down. The volunteer sat down, and again tried to stick the arm down. The arm went up easily.

Many artists and writers have done their work standing up, Campbell said.

Now, top corporate executives are using stand-up desks built in their offices.

The Danes also have experimented with everything from rigorous exercises before school-time naps, to playing Baroque music as a background to reading.

And in Japan educators test children to see if they are "larks" or "owls" — those who peak in mental activity in the morning or evening. Their scheduling is then arranged to their strengths.

But while much of Campbell's first workshop session on Sanibel referred to the American educational system, he did instruct the adults in how they, too, could utilize both sides of their brains better.

"Most people stop thinking at age 28," Campbell said. "We find a thinking pattern that works for us. We don't

know how to do lateral thinking. And we don't accept others who don't think like us."

But lateral thinking can be developed, and both sides of the brain can be stimulated into use through a variety of exercises, Campbell said.

Studies have shown that there is a direct relationship between right or left brain dominance and nostril dominance. One nostril usually breathes more deeply and clearly than the other. Since one side of the brain handles the functions of the opposite side of the body, a clearer right nostril would mean that a person is dominated by his left brain.

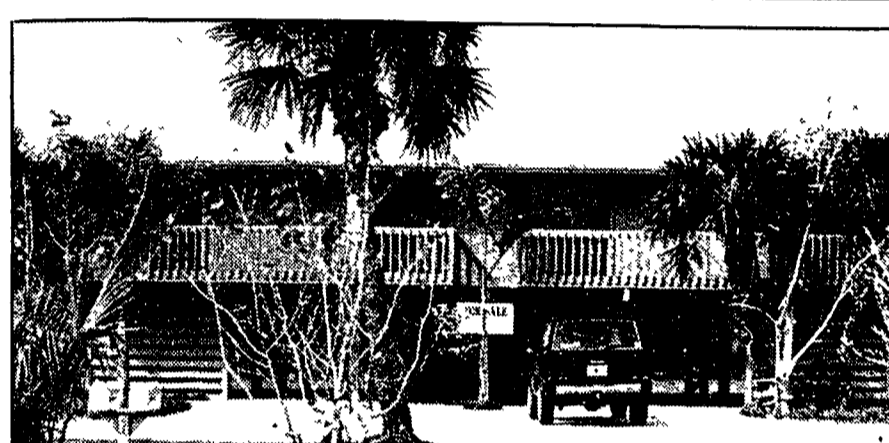
Campbell had his audience sniffing to test which nostril was more clear. Then

they blocked that nostril and kept sniffing in order to "balance" the brain. "Russian athletes have been doing this for years, and in the most recent Olympics you saw many American athletes doing this also," he said.

Campbell also had the workshop members playing numerous amusing games, including a variation of musical chairs. The purpose of the games was to remove that "logic block," where people stop to think the next move instead of instinctively doing the right thing.

When the brain has become balanced through various exercises, then everything seems to be in slow motion, Campbell said.

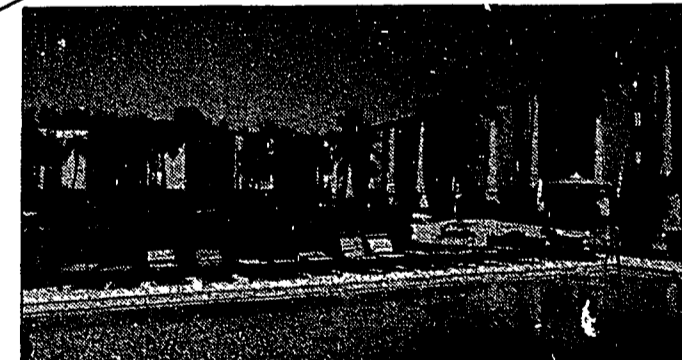

MAHOGANY Swietenia mahogoni

Many of the tropical trees of south Florida listed now as rare species have for various reasons nearly disappeared from the wild and are not commonly known. It was popularity and demand, however, that put the native mahogany on the list of trees threatened in its native south Florida habitat.

Considered the most valuable timber tree in tropical America, mahogany has been logged nearly out of existence. Some of the upper keys and the region of Cape Sable in Everglades National Park retain some fine natural stands in coastal hammocks but north of that it is now extinct.

A tree that usually grows to about 50-feet tall, the mahogany has a dense crown of compound leaves with four to eight leaflets. It is nearly evergreen because old leaves which are shed suddenly in the spring are quickly replaced by fresh new foliage.

Because mahogany will withstand some cold, it grows well in southwest Florida under cultivation. Its fine shape and consistently attractive appearance make it a favorite for roadside plantings and for shade in the home landscape. The trees grow reasonably fast in well-drained areas which they prefer and require little attention.

6 anchovy filets soaked 15 minutes in milk and patted dry
¾ cup of pitted chopped black olives

- 2 TBS capers
- 1 TSP dry mustard
- 1 TSP lemon juice
- 1 TBS olive oil

Put first six ingredients in the food processor fitted with the steel blade to blend. Add the olive oil, scrape contents into a crock and cover with plastic wrap. Serve at room temperature with melba toast rounds.

For the main course I serve one of our favorite Italian dishes. This can be made the morning of the party and served at room temperature.

Sweet and Hot Italian Sausage with Green Peppers
1½ pounds of hot Italian sausage cut in one-inch pieces
1½ pounds of sweet Italian sausage cut in one-inch pieces
7 to 8 green peppers cored, seeded and cut in strips
6 garlic cloves minced

Salt and pepper
2 TBS fresh basil chopped or 2 TSP dried
Enough olive oil to film good-sized au gratin dish.
Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Film the au gratin dish with the oil. Place cut-up sausage in dish top with the green pepper strips. Add the minced garlic, salt, pepper and basil. Cook 45 minutes, turning the sausage pieces twice so they brown somewhat.
Serve with potato salad or cole slaw and some Italian bread.

For dessert serve a marvelous rich chocolate torte. Bake this two days ahead. After it cools on the rack, wrap it in plastic wrap and put in the refrigerator until you decorate it the next day.

Gateau Doris
(I don't know who Doris was, but she obviously knew all about desserts.)

¼ cup of raisins plumped in boiling water, drained and soaked in ¼ cup of rum
6 one-ounce squares of Bakers semi-sweet chocolate
4 TBS soft butter
3 egg yolks
Two-thirds cups granulated sugar
One-quarter cup cake flour
One-third cup finely ground almonds
3 egg whites beaten stiffly with a pinch of salt
Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Butter one spring-form pan and line the bottom with rebuttered parchment paper.
Melt the 6 ounces of semi-sweet chocolate in double boiler, take off the stove and add the 4 TBS butter, one at a time, beating well between each spoonful. Set aside.
Beat the 3 egg yolks and gradually add the two-thirds cup sugar. Beat well until light in color and

thick in consistency. Add the chocolate mix and stir well. Then stir in the almonds and the cake flour. Now add the raisin-rum mix. Stir.

Take one-third of your beaten egg whites and fold into the chocolate mix, then add the rest. Do not try to knock out all the egg white clumps; just fold in gently. Pour into buttered spring form pan. When you place in oven it will bake high, and when you bring it out it will fall. Not to worry; this is normal. Bake 30 minutes, take out, cool on rack. Take a sharp knife and loosen the rim of the pan a bit and open it up. Let cake cool completely before wrapping it in plastic wrap to refrigerate.

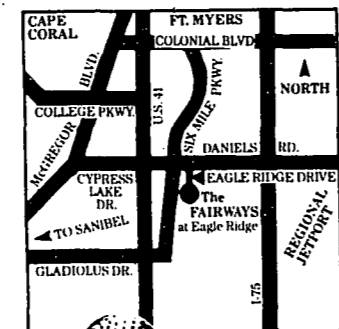

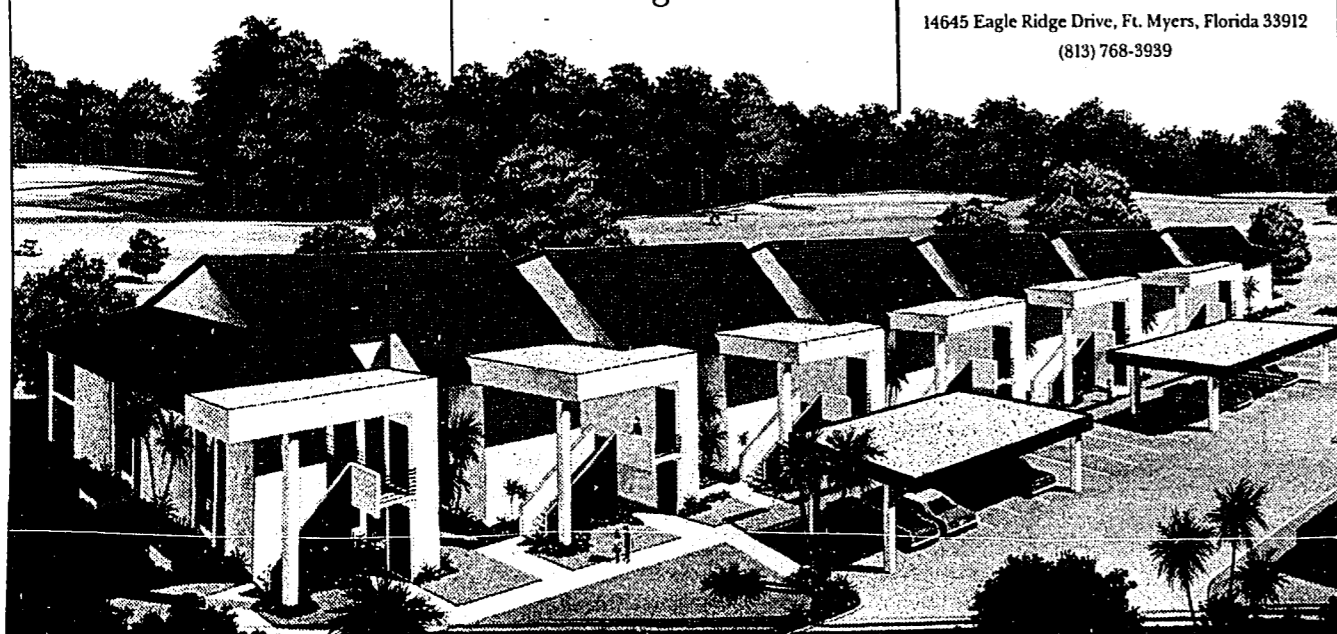

HELP FOR HOOKED BIRDS!
Among the most common injuries to birds received at C.R.O.W. are those caused by their entanglement in fishing line. If a pelican grabs your bait when you are fishing and gets hooked, you can help! Please follow the steps outlined here:

1. Reel bird in slowly.
2. If in a boat, use a landing net and boat the pelican.
3. If on a pier, walk the pelican to shore gently.
4. Cover bird's head with shirt or towel to calm it.
5. Hold middle of bill with one hand and place your other arm over bird's back and around wings.
6. Carry bird to get help.
7. Cut line close to hook and get all monofilament off wings, legs and body.
8. If possible, cut barb from hook and back hook out.
9. If not possible to remove hook, place bird in large box or wrap in towel and bring to C.R.O.W.
10. Call C.R.O.W. at 472-3644.

protect them against such super predators as the alligators. Some dogs, ever running about in the hot sun, might choose to lie in the cool water at the edge of a pond, in complete and blissful ignorance of danger. Such behavior results in dead dogs — and ill-fed alligators.
Our dog law reads in part: "It shall be unlawful for the owner of any dog to permit such dog to be at large in or on any public right-of-way, beach or other public property." That seems to be straight-forward enough — but mark my words, come spring some dogs will die on Sanibel.
Regarding the no-feed-um law, those who make their own rules can easily wiggle out of any charge by claiming the bread and other food thrown into the water was really intended for the fishes or for the birds, not the alligators. Admittedly there is a fine line here, but if the result is the enrich-

ment of an alligator, making him tame and consequently dangerous, then it is better to forego feeding the birds and fishes.
Naturally, the dog victim's owner will, quite unfairly, blame the alligators, while the real culprits are those who feed our prominent crocodilians and those who allow their dogs to run free.
The city of Sanibel was created to preserve and enhance our natural at-

Hypercholesterolemia
Hypercholesterolemia is a condition in which too much cholesterol, a fatty wax-like substance, is circulating in the blood. Cholesterol is manufactured by the body, and comes from animal substances, such as meat, egg yolks and whole milk dairy products. When the amount of cholesterol becomes excessive, it is deposited on or in the lining of the arteries with other fatty substances. Over a period of years, the lining of the arteries becomes thicker and harder, and the channel through which the blood flows is narrowed. When an artery which supplies the heart with oxygenated blood closes off, a heart attack results.

Residents and new visitors have no concept of the original values and principles under which the city was born. Perhaps my comments about alligators will help some of these citizens understand why Sanibel was incorporated.

So once more let me appeal to everyone. Don't feed the alligators. Don't entice them. Don't tame them. An alligator is a wild animal. Leave alone and watch it from a distance.

Keep it a wild animal. Keep it in fear of man. Keep it safe!

Naturalist-conservationist George Campbell participated in a New York Zoological Society study on Sanibel nearly 50 years ago. Subsequently, he visited the island many times and moved here in 1974. Before moving to the island he spent 25 years establishing and working with pharmaceutical manufacturing laboratories in two

dozen countries all over the world. He is founder and chairman of the Southwest Florida Regional Alligator Association and International coordinator of the Fund for Animals, Inc.

Conservation Foundation and as chairman for seven years of the Sanibel Planning Commission, much of Sanibel remains a nature preserve.

Naturalist-illustrator Ann Winterbotham moved to Sanibel 20 years ago from Massachusetts, where she was born and educated and taught art for many years. Through her efforts as a founding member of the Sanibel-Captiva

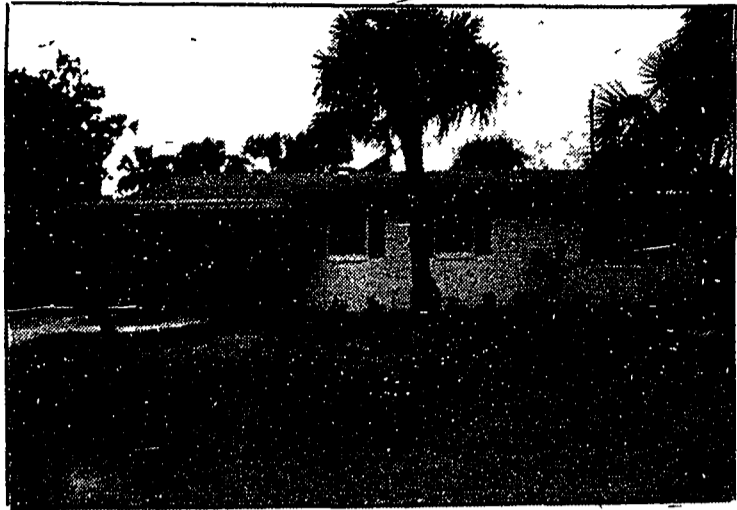

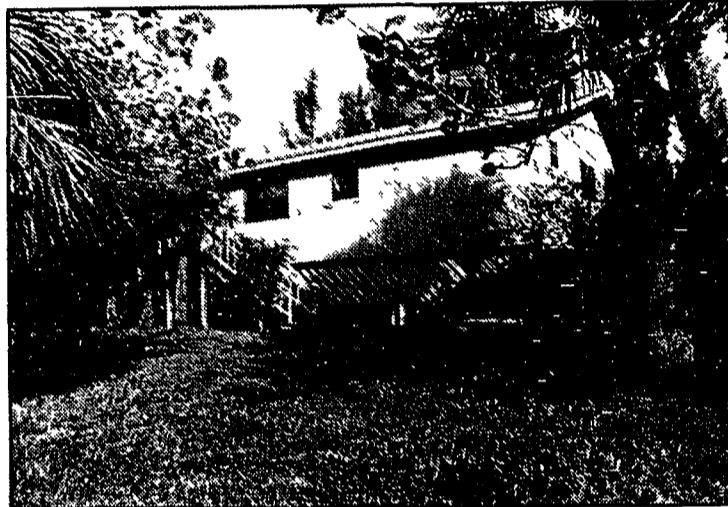

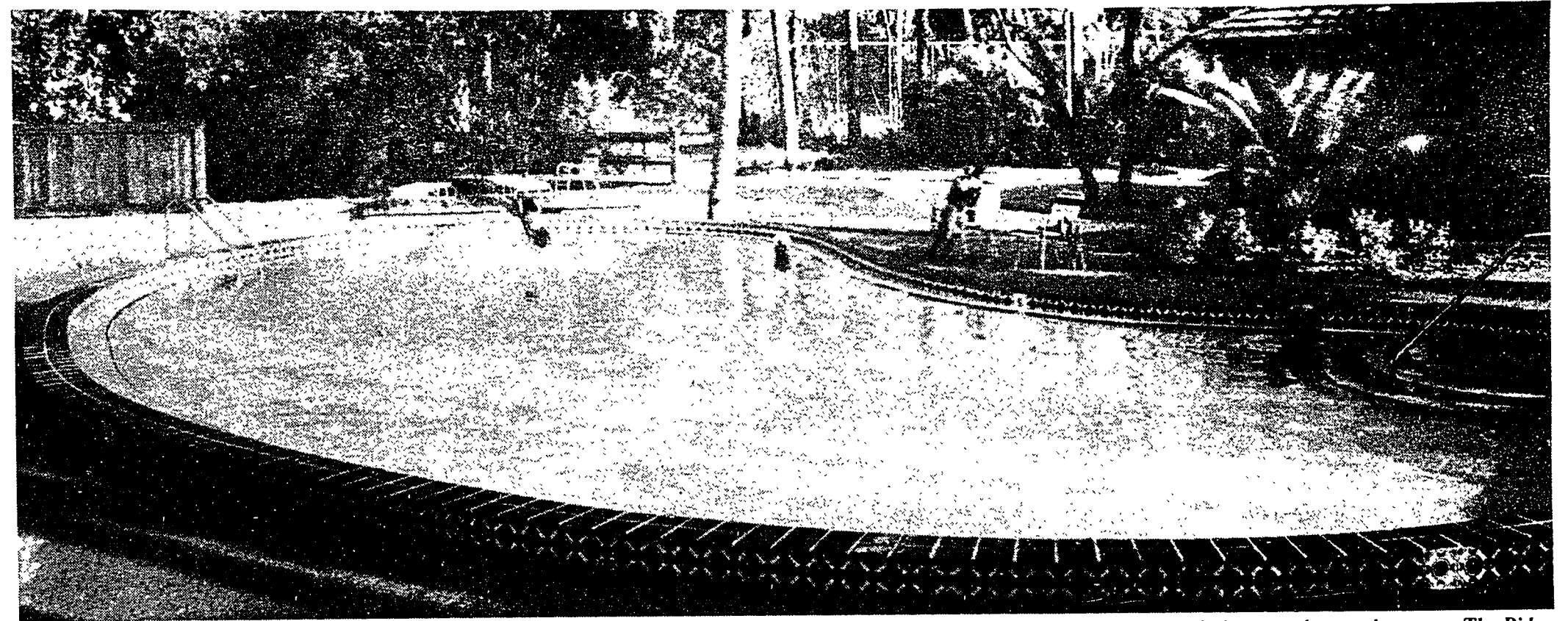

PLAY REVIEW

Delightful humor is no stranger in 'The Foreigner'

Witty, fast-paced, and hilarious are just some of the words that could be used to describe "The Foreigner," the play that opened to a packed house last week at the Pirate Playhouse. After you see it, you might want to add similar adjectives to the list.

Cleverly written by Larry Shue, the comedy is about what happens to a painfully shy man — Charlie Baker — when he is thrust amidst a group of strangers for a long weekend. It is also the story of the good guys versus the bad guys, as we discover things in Tilghman County are not as they seem.

As the play opens, Baker and his friend, Froggy LeSuer, are just arriving at a fishing lodge in Southern Georgia. Froggy has brought Baker to his old haunt to give him a brief three-day respite from the bedside of his terminally ill wife.

Baker, who fairly blanches at the thought of engaging in conversation with anyone (much less a stranger), is panic stricken to discover there are other guests at the inn. To "help" him, Froggy tells the others that "Cha-u-lee" is a foreigner who can speak no English.

The reactions of the others to this silent stranger differ, but their interactions with him are the source of many hilarious moments. Charlie smiles, nods and sips his tea while being taunted, confessed to, and made fun of by almost everyone else.

One exception is the owner of the lodge, Betty Meeks (played by Fran Levy). She is awestruck at the idea of having a foreigner in her midst. She takes to Charlie like hominy to grits, and communicates with him as though he were half deaf or, at least, a half-wit.

The foreigner comes to relish the attention that his new role brings — a fact that Froggy finds thoroughly sickening.

Shue wrings every pun and word-play he can out of this refreshing storyline. Half the fun is that you wind up laughing without anything at all being said — at least anything in a recognizable language. The "dumb feriner," for instance, handily makes a fool out of anyone he wants merely by uttering a (made-up) word.

Jed Harris, an avant garde director not accustomed to working in traditional theater, does well with his relatively large

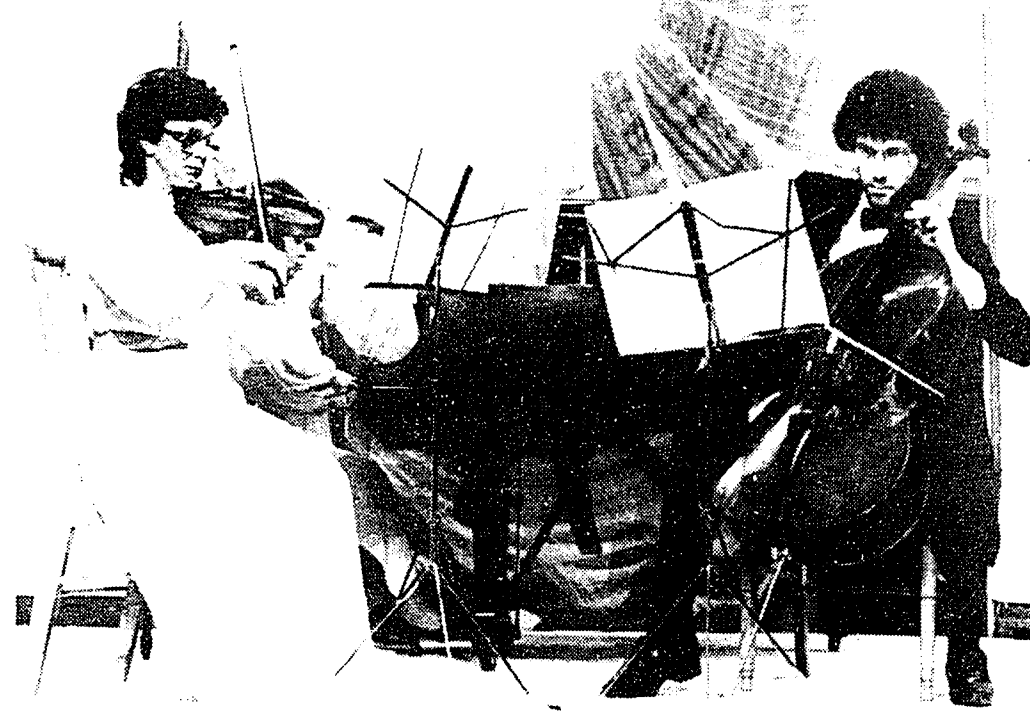
In addition to these two Island performances, the group is playing at 3 p.m. Sunday, March 16, at Christ Lutheran Church in Cape Coral.

cast. Though the play runs nearly three hours, the action never lags and the timing never falters. Banter among the seven characters bounces like a flying ping pong ball, and it never misses a beat, even given the frequent pauses that have to be made to accommodate the very enthusiastic audience.

By now we've come to expect nothing but professional acting at the Pirate Playhouse, and this production furthers that reputation, even though all cast members probably don't fall into the "professional" category.

A good example that comes to mind is David La Croix. The Sanibel city attorney sheds his respectability to become Owen Musser — a seedy, slithering macho redneck who sports a dagger with a deer-hoof handle and a perpetual sneer. The transformation is thoroughly convincing. Occasionally, however, I had to strain to hear his

dialogue.

No stranger to the stage, Sanibel resident Fran Levy handles her role as the wistful, sweet innkeeper with aplomb. Her mostly one-sided attempts at conversation with the foreigner are the source of a good many laughs. But while she might have the mannerisms of an older woman, I had a hard time believing she was the "sweet old lady ... in her twilight years," as another character called her.

Froggy LeSuer is the best part I've seen Gordon Gray play in the two years he has been with the Pirate Playhouse. To the part of the gruff British demolitions expert he brings a touch of naivete, making his character not only very funny, but endearing as well.

Steve Brown's addled Ellard Simms is right on

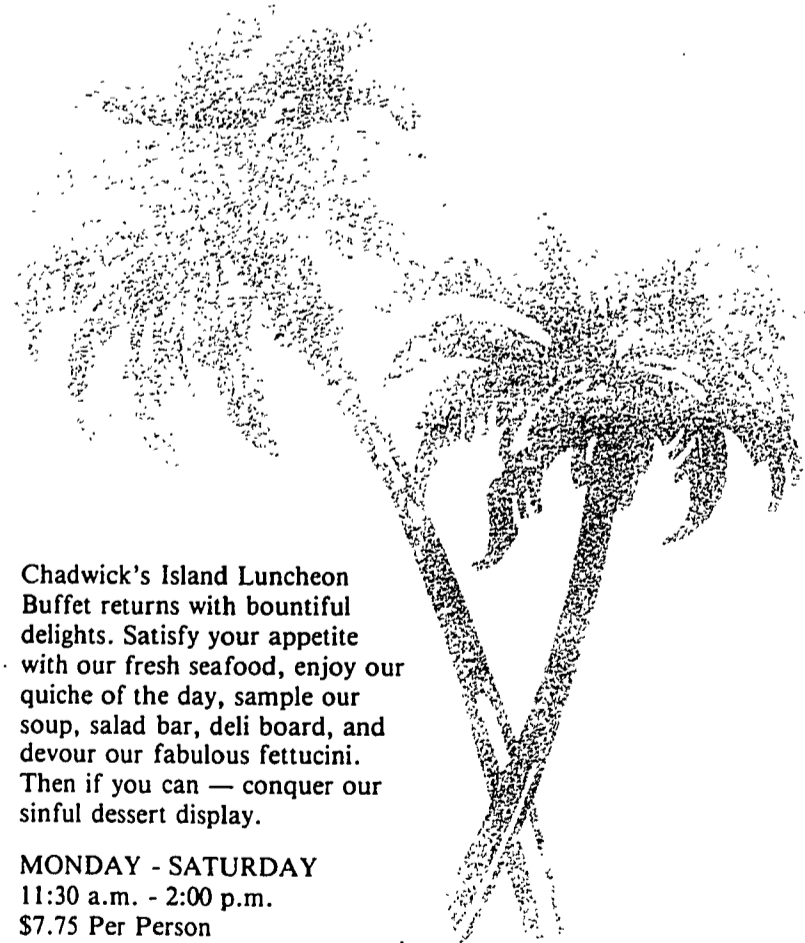

the mark. The audience almost collectively fell off its seat (and not for the last time) during one scene in which he and the foreigner exchange breakfast table rituals, one of which is wearing juice glasses on their heads.

Local actor David Meo brings the right amount of slipperiness to the part of the smooth-talking Rev. David Marshall Lee, a part that easily could have been overdone.

Carrie Lund is very good in her role as the southern debutante, Catherine Simms, though this part does not seem as demanding as some Lund has had in the past. It was interesting to watch her icy deb thaw as the play progressed.

We get to see many of the characters develop during the play, and that's one reason we care what happens to them — most of all, Charlie Baker. As the foreigner, Toperzer once

again exercises his agility as a consummate comedian. He has the gift of making his audience laugh with a gesture or a certain look — and he makes it seem easy. Silly though his character is, we believe in him.

The special effects and the costuming in the play are exceptionally creative, especially in the final, hilarious scene. Unfortunately, theater-in-the-round has its own problems of logistics, and from where I sat it was hard to catch some of the action. For the most part, however, good use was made of the small stage.

The Foreigner should not be missed. I think it's the funniest production at the playhouse in the last two years.

Foul weather doesn't stop windsurfers from racing in championship class regatta

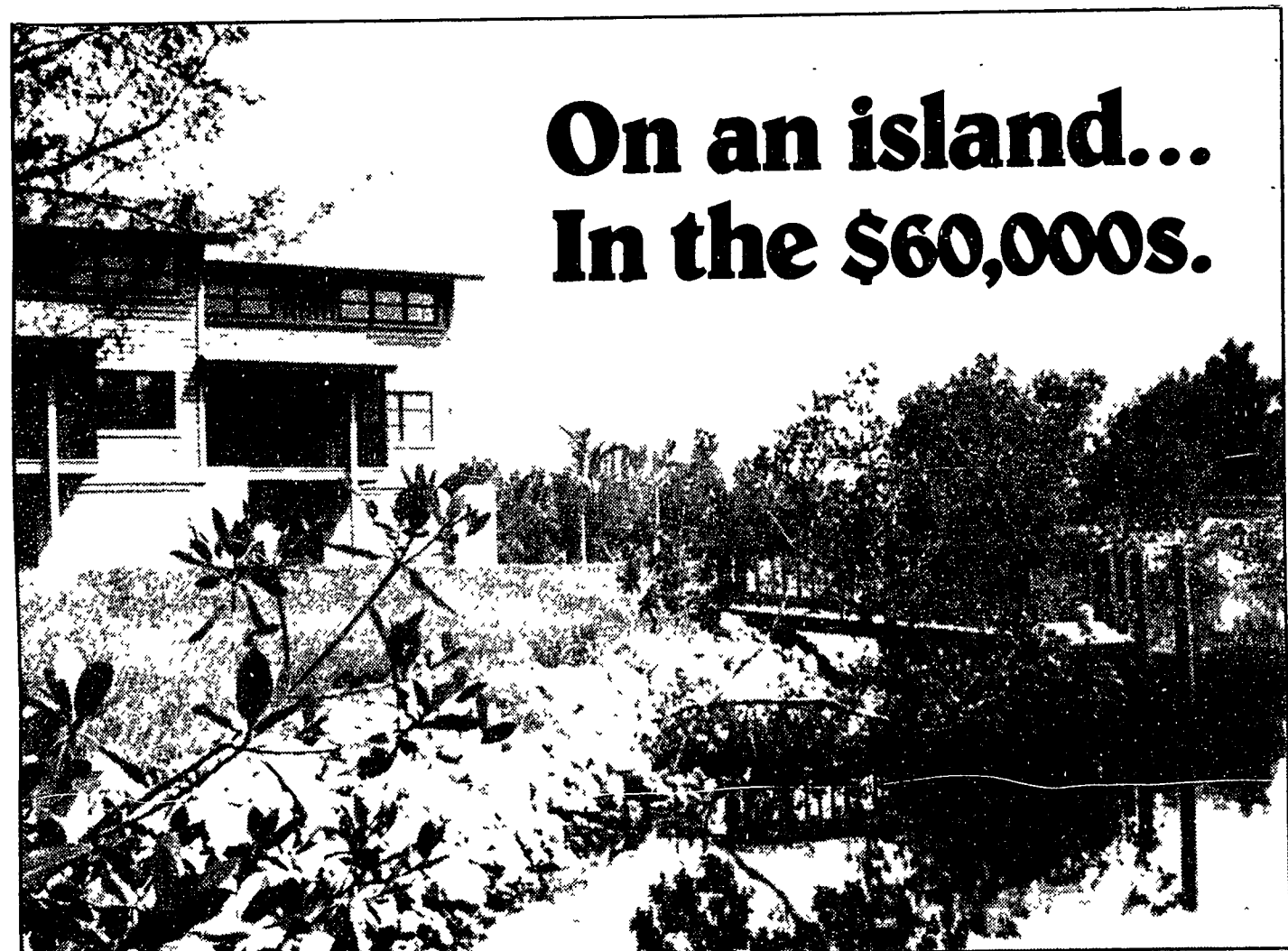

Sailboaters versus power boaters: How long has the battle gone on?

You have to understand that there is a universal truth we are talking about here. It goes something like this: Sailors say power boaters are overbearing, speed-crazed gas guzzlers who don't know even know the most common sea traditions, mainly when it comes to big wakes. Power boaters are prone to call "rag baggers" sluggish snailers who arrive at a marina with a \$10 bill and a bad attitude about power boaters.

I wonder how long the battle has been going on. It's been nearly 10 years since Carol and I sold the sailboat we had lived on for nearly three years and moved ashore. We were part of the purist group. We ONLY sailed with other sailors. We ONLY like to be berthed next to others of our own kind.

When we would see a big power boat leave the docks we would smile knowingly and say something like, "It must be nice to spend \$40 per hour on fuel!"

If we took a trip to Cabbage Key with our sailboat, it might cost us 25 or 50 cents for fuel. But on the other hand, it might take us six hours to get there. Having been around all sorts of boats for so long

Now, I've learned how to raise the hackles of both sides of the fence. I'm going to share with you the secrets to my success. This will come in handy when you can't afford a boat, or when your friend won't take you fishing, or when the tide is too low to get a sailboat out from an expensive marina slip.

As you know, sailors are purists. They absolutely turn red when you misuse a common (to them) nautical term. This is exactly why, when I see a "purer than thou sailor" pull up to the dock, I stop, look thoughtfully up at the running rigging that raises and lowers the sails, and ask, "What do all these strings do?"

If that doesn't work, I quickly follow by pointing at the mast and boom and ask whistfully, "Do these strings hold up those sticks? Knowing they are made

of aluminum, I close out by asking, "What kind of wood are those sticks, anyway?"

Power boaters are a little hard to bring down to reality. First you say, "You sure have great engines in that baby." The owner will beam and say, "I'll say." Then you say, "I read just the other day in Consumer Research magazine that engines like you have in there are only worth 40 percent of the original sale price at the end of the first year."

Here's a little test you can try. Every powerboat ever made is for sale. At a cocktail party the night before, the owner probably went at great length about the merits of his particular boat. Talk to the wife for the real scoop. She'll probably say something like, "It's never worked right since he hit the sandbar." Or, "We sold the boat to help pay for the repairs after he hit the dock when he thought it was in reverse." As I said, EVERY power boat is for sale.

Sailors tend to fall in love with their craft and it becomes member of the family. Stink potters are constantly on the lookout for someone with a small fortune who wants to put it into a boat that sports a depreciation record resembling a rock pitched off the Empire State Building.

The only winners in the boating game are canoeists. They've got a paddle and a spare seat. And they don't take any guff from writers, either.

It pays to keep a sharp eye out for unusual shell forms

A sharp eye for unusual shell forms is the secret to finding many rare specimens on Sanibel and Captiva. This week let's look at a couple of shells that resemble common ones but that are really prized additions to any collection.

For years I thought I was routinely finding turkey wings on the beaches. These are fairly easy to find. They are more rectangular than most bivalve shells on the beaches. The ones that just washed ashore are reddish-brown.

I thought had a great collection of turkey wings, until one day I got to looking a bit more closely at the shells. It seemed that some of my turkey wings had a light-colored hump on the back of each wing. A check of a detailed shell book showed the problem. There are many members of the ark family, and the turkey wing had a close cousin called the mossy ark. I bet if you check your beach finds, you'll have both kinds — once you learn the difference.

Many other shells we find on our beaches have subtle differences. The more you shell, the more likely you are to become an ardent miniature collector.

Finding the little ones takes skill, studying and patience. Most new collectors go for whatever is big. But for a challenge you might look to the smaller shells — many of which only grow to a quarter or half inch at maturity.

Not long ago I came upon a tiny shell that had me stumped. It looked very much like the special,

coveted cowries found in the Florida Keys. These round, smooth-surfaced shells grow to three inches or longer. I've never found a real cowrie around the Islands, although I have heard of such finds. One man I had out on a charter swore he found one off Sanibel. It sure looked like a cowrie to me.

How that (let's call it an alleged) cowrie got here, we can only guess. So it was with some pessimism that I looked down at the tiny little rounded, shiny shell nearly lost in the palm of my hand the other day.

You're probably way ahead of me. I had found a marginella, right? I was holding out for stry, unusual cowrie. Or you might think if it wasn't a margin shell, then it had to be a bubble shell. Fits all the requirements.

The book search led me to an unusual family of shells called trivias. The one I found was a four-spotted trivia. They say the shells reach about a third of an inch long. That's about what mine was. I had to discount the long-lost, valuable cowrie theory.

It wasn't only a day or so later that I got into another bed of tiny shells and came up with another new form to me. This was about half an inch long, light tan and pointed. At first I thought it was a small, bleached miter or dove shell. They all have that flared middle and roughed-up surface. Back to the books again. I had a hunch this was some odd kind of margin.

Seeing there are some 20 kinds of marginellas, I had to be close this time. It turned out to be a dentate marginella. At least that's what it looks like to me. The book says they are found primarily from east Florida to the West Indies. That's not us, but I think I've found one.

Part of shelling is the fun of searching for that one unusual shell you've never found before. Keep looking. Good luck on the beaches this week, and please remember the live shelling ordinance.
