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General Information

Purpose

The ISD300 was developed as an appliance to spool and manage print jobs and to handle print queues.

In complex networks with high volumes of data traffic and in large-scale structures, the ISD300 can substantially relieve server load and remove strain from the network. This results in better performance and enhanced system stability.

The ISD300 adds server qualities to the printing in peer-to-peer networks. Enhanced transparency, higher performance and the central management of all print processes result in maximum efficiency and very little time required for maintenance and system updates.

The ISD300 is able to accept print jobs from various operating systems and to forward them to the printer via Socket, LPD, or IPP.

Safety Regulations

Before starting the initial operation procedure and during the operation procedure of the ISD300, please read the following safety regulations:

- The ISD300 may only be connected to the mains and to the network by qualified personnel.
- Do not open the housing of the device. The ISD300 may only be connected and operated if the housing is not opened and if the ISD300 is in perfect condition. Do not put objects on top of the housing.
- The ISD300 must be placed on a solid surface with no vibration. The device must not be operated in dusty places and direct sunlight. Avoid contact with humidity or liquids. The ISD300 may only be connected and operated if the installation location meets the ambient conditions; see: Technical Data on page 4.
- If the supplied power cord cannot be used in your country, acquire an appropriate power cord that suits national provisions. For more information, please consult your retailer.
- Make sure that no-one steps on or stumbles over the cables.
- The ISD300 must be connected to a socket with protective contact.
- Position the ISD300 in a way that guarantees that the socket for the connection of the power cord is in the proximity of the device and is easily accessible. Make sure that the device can be separated easily from the network. A damaged power cord must be replaced immediately. For more information, please consult your retailer.
- Do not connect a telephone cable to the RJ-45 connector. The RJ-45 connector may only be connected to SELV voltages. For the connection to the RJ-45 connector only S/UTP cabling (category 5 or better) may be used. The shielding must fit flushly to the connector.
- Use a certified USB Hi-Speed cable to connect the printer. A list of certified cables may be found at <u>www.usb.org</u>!

Using the Panel Interface

A number of actions can be carried out via the unit's operating panel. The figure shows the components of the panel interface.




Figure: ISD300 front and rear view

The ISD300's operating panel can be protected from unauthorized access with a 4-digit PIN. The administrator sets the PIN on the ISD300 Homepage. If the panel is locked, the requested PIN is entered directly on the device.

The following actions can be carried out via the panel interface:

- How to switch on the ISD300?
- Entering the PIN
- How to get information from the front display?
- How to switch off the ISD300?
- Setting TCP/IP parameter manually via panel interface
- Setting TCP/IP parameter automatically (DHCP) via panel interface



How to switch on the ISD300?

Proceed as follows:

- 1. Switch on the power switch on the backside.
- 2. Switch on the soft power switch w on the frontside.

The ISD300 boots automatically.

How to switch off the ISD300?

Print jobs that are halted by the device being switched off will not be completed. Print jobs in a queue will be completed when the device reboots. This also applies in the case of power failures. To avoid loss of data, shutdown the ISD300 before you switch off the power switch.

Proceed as follows:

- 2. Switch off the power switch on the backside.

How to get information from the front display?

It is possible to get the following informations via the display of the panel interface:

- IP Address,
- Date and Time,
- Harddisk usage,
- MAC Address

To get information use the navigation key ◀ on the ISD300. The information is indicated in sequence.



Using the ISD300 Homepage

Initial installation, configuration and subsequent administration of the ISD appliances as well as management of the relevant network printers can be carried via the integrated web server (ISD300 Homepage). Administration is entirely independent of operating systems and locations, so it can be done from any workstation within the network.

Exception: With the 'Point and Print' method the driver installation and editing of the user rights is adjusted via a Client PC.



Only versions of Netscape Navigator 4.0 or later and Microsoft Internet Explorer 4.0 or later are supported. For the display we recommend a resolution of 1024 x 768 Pixel at least.

After start the ISD300 Homepage the 'Login' dialog appears. Access to the ISD300 Homepage is defined for three user groups.

How to open the ISD300 Homepage?

Before starting the ISD300 Homepage it is neccesary to assign an IP Address to the ISD300; see How to set TCP/IP Parameters? (IP, Netmask, Gateway)

- 1. Start your web browser.
- 2. Enter the IP address of the ISD300 as URL. The ISD300 Homepage is displayed. If the Homepage is not displayed, check the proxy settings of your browser.

After the Homepage was started you have to log on; see: How to log on to the ISD300 Homepage? on page 11.



How to log on to the ISD300 Homepage?

Access to the ISD300 is defined for three user groups: 'Any', 'User', and 'Admin'. For further information see: Login Accounts on page 50.

The instructions describe the login as administrator.

- 1. Start the ISD300 Homepage
- Click Admin.
- 3. Enter the user name and the password: user name: 'admin' (default setting) password: 'admin' (default setting)
- Click **OK** to confirm.
 The user interface for the administrator is displayed.

Structure of the ISD300 Homepage

The main menu is displayed on the left side of the dialog. After a menu point was selected the submenu will appear at the top of the dialog.

After login some basic information about the ISD300 are displayed. In addition to details about the login, the host name and the IP address, you get the following information:

Network Settings

In order to work with the ISD300, Host, Date and TCP/IP parameters must be set. In order to set all parameters, use the Quick Setup for an easy configuration.



ISD300 Network settings can be configured by administrators only.

How to set TCP/IP Parameters? (IP, Netmask, Gateway)

The TCP/IP parameter can be set in different ways. You can assign the TCP/IP parameter manually or have it assigned automatically via DHCP (Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol). The manually assignment is default. You can set the TCP/IP parameter via the panel interface or the ISD300 Homepage.

What do you want to do?

- Setting TCP/IP parameter manually via panel interface
- Setting TCP/IP parameter automatically (DHCP) via panel interface
- Setting TCP/IP parameter via ISD300 Homepage

Setting TCP/IP parameter manually via panel interface

Use the navigation keys on the panel interface to assign the TCP/IP parameter manually.



Proceed as follows:

- Press ...
 IP Setup | Cancel appears in the display.
- 2. Press ▶ to confirm.

 IP Configuration appears in the display.
- 3. Select Manual via .
- 4. Press ▶ to confirm.

 IP Address: 000.000.000.000 appears in the display.
- Enter the IP address.
 Use ♠ to navigate to individual numerical values within the IP address. Change individual numerical values via ♠ ▼.
- 6. Press b to confirm.

 Netmask: 000.000.000.000 appears in the display.
- 7. Enter the netmask.
- 8. Press ▶ to confirm.

 Gateway:000.000.000.000 appears in the display.
- 9. Enter the gateway.
- 10. Press ▶ to confirm.

 Apply | Back appears in the display.
- 11. Press ▶ to confirm.

The settings are saved.

Setting TCP/IP parameter automatically (DHCP) via panel interface

Use the navigation keys on the panel interface to set TCP/IP parameter via DHCP.

Proceed as follows:

- Press ▲.
 IP Setup | Cancel appears in the display.
- Press ▶ to confirm.
 IP Configuration appears in the display.
- 3. Select DHCP via



- Press ▶ to confirm.
 Apply | Back appears in the display.
- 5. Press ▶ to confirm.

Upon booting DHCP will be applied automatically. TCP/IP parameters are assigned by a DHCP server.

Setting TCP/IP parameter via ISD300 Homepage

Proceed as follows:

- 1. Click Configuration.
- 2. Click TCP/IP.
- 3. Enter the TCP/IP paramter manually or enable the 'DHCP' option; see Table: Parameter Settings TCP/IP.
- 4. Click Set.

Table: Parameter Settings - TCP/IP

Parameter	Description
IP address	IP address of the ISD300 (e.g. 192.168.0.21)
Netmask	Netmask
Gateway	IP address of the gateway used to access other networks or subnets. This enables the ISD300 to communicate with devices on other subnets.
DHCP	Enable DHCP to set TCP/IP parameter via DHCP. The TCP/IP parameters are assigned by a DHCP server during the next reboot of the ISD300.

How to set a Host Name?

You can set a host name for the ISD300. The host name and the IP address are displayed at the top left side of the browser window.

Proceed as follows:

- 1. Click Configuration.
- 2. Click Board Settings.



- 3. Enter the Host name (max. 256 characters).
- 4. Click Set.

How to set Date and Time?

Date and time specifications are necessary if you want to display the time at which the print job was printed. Date and time specifications are displayed in the Job History.

Date and time can be entered manually during the Quick Setup also; see: How to configure via Quick Setup? on page 17.

Date and time can be adjusted manually or obtained from a time server.




If you use a time server, the manually entered time will be overwritten by the time provided by the time server.

Proceed as follows:

- 1. Click Configuration.
- 2. Click Board Settings.
- 3. Enter time and date or use a time server; see Table: Parameter Settings Board.
- 4. Click Set.

Parameter	Description
Default name	Default name of the ISD300 set by the manufacturer
Host name	Host name of the ISD300 set by the administrator (max. 256 characters)
Date	Date in the format: dd.mm.yyyy (e.g. 23.05.2004)
Time	Time in the format: hh:mm (e.g. 16:36)
Time server	IP address or the host name of the time server (e.g. 'ntp1.ptb.de') The 'ntp' protocol is used.



How to set DNS?

DNS is service that translates domain names into IP addresses. Using DNS, names can be assigned to IP addresses and vice versa. In order to use this functionality, specify the primary DNS server by its IP address.

Proceed as follows:

- 1. Click Configuration.
- 2. Click DNS.
- 3. Enter the data; see Table: Parameter Settings DNS.
- 4. Click Set.

Table: Parameter Settings - DNS

Parameter	Description
Domain name	Domain name of an existing DNS domain (e.g. company.de)
Primary DNS server	IP address of the primary DNS server (e.g. 192.168.0.21)
Secondary DNS server	IP address of the secondary DNS server. The secondary DNS server is used if the first one is not available.
Domain search list	Suffixes for the domain search list separated by blanks (e.g. soft.seh.de)

How to configure via Quick Setup?

The Quick Setup is intended for setting up initial parameters and queues. A prerequisite for the Quick Setup is that you are logged on as administrator on the ISD300 Homepage.



The Quick Setup involves four steps:

- general settings
- TCP/IP parameters
- the search for available printers in the network
- the setting up of queues

Proceed as follows:

- 1. Click Quick setup.
- 2. Enter the host name, date, and time.
- 3. Click **Next** to confirm.
- 4. Enter the TCP/IP parameter.
- 5. Click Next to confirm.
- 6. Enter a start and end IP address for the printer search. A maximum of 255 IP addresses can be searched through at a time.
- 7. Click **Next** to confirm.

 You will get a message of the number of printers found in the network.
- 8. Click **OK** to confirm. A list of printers is displayed.
- 9. Enter a name for the queues in the column **Queue name**; see: Queue Name Conventions on page 18.
- 10. Click **Install**.

The name of the queue appears dimmed in the column **Queue name**.

11. Click Finish setup.

Table: Queue Name Conventions

Queue Name Conventions

- letters and numbers are allowed
- hyphens and underscores are allowed
- no space characters
- no more than 32 characters (Windows 98 max. 15 characters)





If you want to use 'Point and Print', we recommended to assign print drivers to the queues after the Quick Setup; see: Managing Print Drivers on page 26.



Microsoft Authentication (SMB)

MS Windows client access to installed queues can be restricted by using the SMB protocol. This method uses users and groups with associated passwords. The list of users and groups can be managed locally or taken from a Windows Domain Controller or Active Directory Server.

MS domain security is a characteristic that allows administrators to authorize or restrict print administration and services to define users and groups by using their existing user name and password of the domain

A domain is a collection of network servers and other computers that share a security and user account for each user. A user logs on to the domain and not to individual servers in the domain.



Microsoft Authentication settings can be managed by administrators only.

How to display MS Windows Network information?

Click **SMB** printing in the main menu to open the **MS** Windows page. The page displays the following information depending from the setups.

Host / Net BIOS name	NetBIOS name of the ISD300
WINS server	IP address or host name of the WINS server
Workgroup	Name of the workgroup
(Active Directory) Domain name	Name of the domain
Password server	IP address (e.g. 192.168.0.112) or DNS name (e.g. security.seh.de) of the password server
Server role	Role of the ISD300 in the network environment
Status	Member or not a member of a domain

How to use the ISD300 as a member of a Domain? (Windows NT or Active Directory)

Microsoft domain security is a feature that allows administrators to easily authorize or restrict print administration and services to specific groups or users by using their existing user name and password of the domain.

If the ISD300 is member of a domain (Windows NT or Active Directory) users are authenticated against user and group accounts of the selected domain.

Proceed as follows:

- 1. Click SMB printing.
- 2. Click Change.
- 3. Select Domain member.



- 4. Click Next.
- Select the Domain controler.
 Use the NTLM method to authenticate users against the Active Directory or NT 3.5x/4.0 domain controler.
 Use Kerberos to authenticate users against the Active Directory domain controler.
- 6. Click Next.
- 7. Enter the data; see Table: Parameter Settings MS Windows Domain member.
- 8. Click Next.
- Enter administrator account and password.
 To create a computer account on the domain controler you need to use a Windows account with administrative rights on the domain controler.
- 10. Click Next.

WINS server	IP address (e.g. 192.168.0.227) of the WINS server



How to use the ISD300 as Stand-Alone Server? (Local Authentication)

The ISD300 is used as Stand-Alone-Server in the network environment. Users are authenticated against the local user- and group accounts. For further information; see: How to set Local Users and Groups? on page 23.

Proceed as follows:

- 1. Click SMB printing.
- 2. Click Change.
- 3. Select Stand-Alone server.
- 4. Click Next.
- 5. Enter a workgroup.
- 6. Enter the IP address of the WINS server.
- 7. Click Next.

The Network settings are changed.

How to set Local Users and Groups?

'Local Users and Groups' is an important security feature because the administrator can limit the ability of users and groups to perform certain actions by assigning them rights and permissions. Local user or group is an account that can grant permissions and rights.



Local users and groups can be managed by the administrators only.

What do you want to do?

- Creating a user
- Deleting a user
- Changing the password of a user
- Assigning a user to groups
- Creating a group
- Deleting a group



Creating a user

Proceed as follows:

- 1. Click SMB printing.
- 2. Click Local users&groups.
- 3. Click Create new user.
- 4. Enter the username and the password. System user- and groupnames (root, LP, sys, users...) cannot be used.
- 5. Confirm the new password.
- 6. Click Create.

Deleting a user

Proceed as follows:

- 1. Click SMB printing.
- 2. Click Local users&groups.
- 3. Choose a user.
- 4. Click Delete user.

Changing the password of a user

Proceed as follows:

- 1. Click SMB printing.
- 2. Click Local users&groups.
- 3. Choose a user.
- 4. Click change password.
- 5. Enter the password.
- 6. Confirm the new password.
- 7. Click Set.

Assigning a user to groups

Proceed as follows:

- 1. Click SMB printing.
- 2. Click Local users&groups.
- Choose a user.



- 4. Click Set group membership.
- 5. Assign the groups via the Add and the Remove button.
- 6. Click Set.

Creating a group

Proceed as follows:

- 1. Click SMB printing.
- 2. Click Local users&groups.
- 3. Click Local groups.
- 4. Click Create new grous.
- 5. Enter a group name.
- 6. Click Create.

Deleting a group

Proceed as follows:

- 1. Click SMB printing.
- 2. Click Local users&groups.
- 3. Click Local groups.
- 4. Choose a group.
- 5. Click Delete group.

How to set a Printer Administrator Account?

The specified Windows account can upload printer drivers on the ISD300 and change printing defaults. If no account is specified, administrative access to the ISD300 from Windows clients is disabled. The 'printer administrator' is selected from a list of 'local users/groups' or domain members.

Proceed as follows:

- 1. Click SMB printing.
- 2. Click Printer administrator.
- 3. Choose a user or group from the list.
- 4. Click Set.



Managing Print Drivers

In order to print, assign a driver to the queues. If you want to assign a driver to a queue via 'Point and Print', store the driver on the ISD300 first.

If required, the 'Point and Print' function automatically installs the relevant drivers on the clients. To make use of this function, the respective drivers must be centrally stored on the relevant ISD appliance beforehand.



Print drivers can be managed by administrators only.

How to prepare the ISD300 for 'Point and Print'?

Point and Print (automatic printer driver installation) is the easiest and quickest way to print in heterogeneous Microsoft networks via the ISD300. All necessary files and configuration information are automatically downloaded from the print server to the client.

Note the following aspects if you want to use Point and Print:

- All necessary printer drivers must be stored on the ISD300; see: How to store Drivers on the ISD300? (Windows XP/2000) on page 27 or see: How to store Drivers on the ISD300? (Windows NT 4.0) on page 28.
- The stored printer drivers need to be assigned to the queues; see: How to assign Windows Print Driver to several Queues? on page 28.



• The printer drivers that are required for printing will be installed automatically on the connected clients; see: How to use 'Point and Print' with your PC client? on page 29.

How to store Drivers on the ISD300? (Windows XP/2000)

In heterogeneous networks, a separate printer driver has to be stored on the ISD300 for each operating system. If there are, for example, clients with the operating systems Windows XP and Windows 98, you have to store the printer drivers on the ISD300 for both operating systems.



Print drivers can be stored by printer administrators only. For further information see: How to set a Printer Administrator Account? on page 25.

Proceed as follows:

- 1. Click **Run** on the start menu to establish a connection to the ISD300.
- 2. Enter the IP address of the ISD300. Syntax: \\<IP address of the ISD300>
- 3. Click **OK**.

 The connection will be established.
- Click Printers (and Faxes).
 The window Printers (and Faxes) appears.
- Click Server Properties on the File menu.
 The window Print Server Properties appears.
- 6. Select the **Drivers** tab.
- 7. Click **Add**.
 The Printer Driver Wizard is started.
- 8. Follow the instructions of the Wizard.
- 9. If you use further operating systems, install the relevant printer drivers.



How to store Drivers on the ISD300? (Windows NT 4.0)



Print drivers can be stored by printer administrators only. For further information see: How to set a Printer Administrator Account? on page 25.

Proceed as follows:

- Click Run on the start menu.
- 2. Enter the **IP address** of the ISD300. Syntax: \\<IP address of the ISD300>
- 3. Click **OK** to confirm.
- 4. Double-click Printers.
- Double-click New Printers.
 The window Add Printer Wizard appears.
- 6. Click Next to confirm.
- 7. Activate Samba Printer.
- 8. Click Next to confirm.
- 9. Follow the Wizard.
- Click **Finish** to complete the installation.
 An error Message appers.
- 11. Click **OK**.

The printer drivers have been installed on the ISD300 despite the error message.



A NT error message ('failed attempt to install a printer on the ISD300') can be ignored.

How to assign Windows Print Driver to several Queues?

If you want to assign a Windows driver to a queue, store the driver on the ISD300 first. For further information see: How to store Drivers on the ISD300? (Windows XP/2000) on page 27 or How to store Drivers on the ISD300? (Windows NT 4.0).





If no Windows driver has been stored on the ISD300, the 'Available drivers' box is empty. Print drivers can be assigned by administrators only.

Proceed as follows:

- 1. Click SMB printing.
- 2. Click Windows drivers.
- 3. Select the queues.
- 4. Choose a driver from the 'Available drivers' box.
- Click Assign.

How to use 'Point and Print' with your PC client?

The following step finalizes the 'point and print' procedure. The assigned printer drivers will be installed on the client.

Proceed as follows:

- 1. Click Run on the Windows start menu.
- 2. Enter the IP address of the ISD300. Syntax: \\<IP address of the ISD300>
- 3. Click OK.
- 4. Select the required queue.
- 5. Click **Connect** on the **File** menu.

 The printer driver will be installed on the PC client.



Managing Queues and Jobs

There are different queue types. The queue type specifies which protocol is used to send the print data from the ISD300 to the network printer. For further information; see: Types of Queues on page 31.

Click **Queues/Jobs** in the main menu to open the **Print Queues** page. The page displays a list of all queues with details; see Table Parameter Information - Print Queues.

Parameter	Description




Types of Queues

The queue type specifies which protocol is used to send the print data from the ISD300 to the network printer.

Table: Information - Queue Types

Queue Type	Description
TCP/IP socket printing	The queue Socket/HP JetDirect sends print jobs to a network printer that prints via TCP/IP socket printing. When creating the queue, the printer's IP address or host name and the TCP/IP port have to be specified. The same TCP/IP port must also be configured on the network card of the printer.





How to create a Queue?

Queues can be created in two ways.

Automatically

During set-up, all print servers / network printers available in the network are quickly identified by means of an automated search



routine, and made available as print queues. Using the Quick Setup; see: How to configure via Quick Setup? on page 17. Once the automatic search for available print servers fails to find a device, you can still setup, manually.


Manually

Proceed as follows:

- 5. Choose the queue type.

How to modify a Queue?

The description, location, type, and connected printer settings of a queue can be modified:

- 4. Change the location string if desired.
- 5. Click Next.
- 6. Change the queue type if desired.

- 8. Change the settings of the connected printer if desired.
- 9. Click OK.

How to stop or restart a Queue? (Accumulate Print Jobs)

It is possible to accumulate print jobs in a queue and to print them at a later date. In order to do this, you must stop the queue. All incoming print jobs are stored in the queue.

When the queue is restarted later, all pending jobs are printed one after another. You can also store all printed jobs in the job repository or the queue.

Proceed as follows:

- 1. Click Queues/Jobs.
- 2. Click Settings in the list of queues.
- 3. Click **Stop** to stop the queue or click **Start** to restart the queue.

How to reject or accept Print Jobs?

It is possible to configure queues in such a way that this accepts or rejects print jobs. This is important when a queue is not operational.

Proceed as follows:

- Click Queues/Jobs.
- 2. Click **Setting** in the list of queues.



3. Click Reject jobs or Accept jobs.

How to assign a Filter Application (3party software) to a Queue?

The ISD300 may be used as a platform for specific, printing related software solutions provided by third parties (e.g. an SAP Barcode printing solution) or developed by customers themselves. This makes the ISD appliances perfectly adaptable to diverse environments and individual requirements.

Multple filters can be bound to a selectable queue. To use filter applications install the third party software to the ISD300 (see: How to install Software? on page 62) and assign the filter to a queue.

Proceed as follows:

- Click Queues/Jobs.
- 2. Click Settings in the list of queues.
- 3. Click Filter.
- 4. Select a Filter from the Available-List.
- 5. Click Add.
- 6. Click Confirm.

How to delete a Queue?

It is possible to delete a queue. All pending jobs in the queue will also be deleted.

Proceed as follows:

- Click Queues/Jobs.
- 2. Click **Settings** in the list of queues.
- 3. Click Delete queue.
- 4. Click **OK** to confirm.

How to display all active Jobs?

The jobs that are being printed can be viewed. Information about e.g. the owner, the name and the size of the print job are available.

Proceed as follows:

Click Queues/Jobs.



2. Click Current Jobs.

The active jobs will be displayed.

If you want to change the properties of print jobs of one queue, just click on the queue name in the list.

How to display a Job History?

The last few printed jobs are displayed in the job history. Information about e.g. the owner, the name and the size of the print job are available.

Proceed as follows:

- 1. Click Queues/Jobs.
- 2. Click History.

The job history for all queues will be displayed.

How to manage a Print Job?

In queues print jobs can be managed in different ways. (e.g. restart, delete, hold, release, move to the top (priority)).

- 4. Select an action.

How to move a Print Job to another Queue?

When a printer is not operational, it is possible to move a print job to another queue.

- 3. Select the print jobs.
- 4. Select a gueue from the 'Move jobs to Queue' listbox.



How to print one Job on several Printers? (Copy Queue)

Using a copy queue it is possible to print the same print job on several printers. The copy queue sends the print job to all member queues. For further information see: Copy queue on page 33.

Proceed as follows:

- Click Create Queue.
- 3. Enter a name for the queue.
- 4. Click Next.
- 5. Choose Copy queue as device type.
- 6. Click Next.

How to print a Test Page?

In order to test queues and printers, you can print a test page.

- 4. Click Print Test page.



Printing methods

You can print to the ISD300 by several methods. They specify which protocol is used to send the print data from the client to the ISD300. Usually you define this, while setting up a printer on your client PC.

LPD Printing

Every queue created during the Quick Setup automatically supports LPD printing. The port name for the configuration of the client must be identical with the queue name on the ISD300.

Point & Print

Point and Print is a term that refers to the capability of allowing a user on a Windows client to create a connection to a remote printer without providing disks or other installation media. IPP Printing

Every queue created during Quick Setup automatically supports IPP printing. Please use the following syntax for the configuration of the client:

syntax: http://<IP address or host name of the ISD300>:631/printers/<queue name on the ISD300>

example: http://192.168.0.123:631/printers/MY QUEUE

Socket Printing

It is possible to assign TCP ports in the range from 9100 to 9107 to print queues. By this way clients may send print jobs to the ISD300 via socket printing and address a queue.

Proceed as follows:

- 3. Select a gueue for each TCP port.
- 4. Click **Set**.
 The queue is assigned to the port number.

ThinPrint[®]

The ISD300 come with an integrated ThinPrint[®] server. Used as a gateway, the ISD appliances receive and decompress print jobs that have previously been compressed and optimised relating to the bandwidth required for their transmission via the ThinPrint technology. ThinPrint is primarily used in Server-based computing.

The ISD300 receives jobs from a ThinPrint[®] server and sends the jobs to the network printer either via socket printing, IPP printing or LPD printing depending on the type of the gueue.

For using the ISD300 in a ThinPrint[®] environment, a ThinPrint[®] ID must be assigned to each queue. This ID can be any numeric value from 0 to 400.

Proceed as follows:

- 3. Enter the ThinPrint[®] ID.
- 4 Click Set



Using ISD300 as DHCP / DNS Server

The ISD300 comes with an integrated DHCP/DNS server. Compared with dedicated DHCP/DNS servers the ISD300 provides a limited set of features. It is designed for small networks without complex administrative structures.

What do you want to do?

How to set the DHCP Service?

DHCP (Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol) is an Internet protocol for automating the configuration of computers. DHCP can be used to automatically assign IP addresses, to deliver TCP/IP stack configuration parameters such as the subnet mask and default router, and to provide other configuration information.



DHCP service can be set by administrators only.

Proceed as follows:

- Click DHCP & DNS.
- Click Configure DHCP server.
- 3. Enter the **IP address range**; see: Parameter Settings DHCP Server on page 45.
- 4. Enter the **Fixed IP addresses**; see: Parameter Settings DHCP Server on page 45.
- 5. Enter the **DHCP Options**; see: Parameter Settings DHCP Server on page 45.
- 6. Click Save.

How to display the lease file?

Information about the DHCP Server configuration is shown in a lease file.

Proceed as follows:

How to set DNS Server?

DNS (Domain Name System) is a service translating names into IP addresses. DNS is very helpful in particular since names are retained a lot easier than multiple digits numbers (i.e. Titan instead of 192.168.0.231). In addition, DNS allows for more flexibility since names may be assigned independent of IP addresses, therefore, enabling names to be changed or assigned to a different IP address at any time.

The task of the DNS server as Slave (Primary) is the sharing of load. In this way a faster allocation is reached within DNS structure.





DNS can be set by administrators only.

Proceed as follows:

- 1. Click DHCP & DNS.
- 2. Click Configure DNS server.
- 3. Enter the data; see: Parameter Settings DNS Server on page 47.
- 4. Click Save.

After DNS is configured, the server must be started; see: How to start/stop the DHCP or DNS Server? on page 48.

Security

Access to the ISD300 and to the entire configuration is controlled by means of a multiple level access protection.



ISD300 security can be configured by administrators only.

Panel Lock (PIN)

The ISD300's operating panel can be protected from unauthorized access with a 4-digit PIN. If the panel is locked, the requested PIN is entered directly on the device.

Setting the PIN

The administrator sets the PIN on the ISD300 Homepage. The PIN defaults to '0000'. With this PIN, the panel is not protected. If the factory default settings are restored, the PIN is erased, i.e. it is reset to the default value.

Entering the PIN

Certificates

The communication via the Web interface may be encrypted using HTTPs (SSL). Self-signed certificates (SSLv3) and CA certificates can be used in TCP/IP-based networks to encrypt data and to authenticate communication partners.

- Self-signed certificates have a digital signature that has been created by the ISD300.
- CA certificates are certificates that have been signed by a certification authority (CA). The authenticity of the CA certificate can be verified by means of a so-called root



certificate issued by the certification authority. The root certificate is stored on an authentication server in the network.

Upon delivery, a self-signed certificate (the so-called default certificate) is stored on the ISD300. If you set up encrypted printing via https the default certificate is used. It is recommended that you replace the default certificate by a self-signed certificate or CA certificate.



IP Sender Protection (Restricting Printing Access)

Printing access to a queue can be restricted to IP addresses (e.g. 192.168.0.247) or ranges (e.g. 192.168.0.*). If no entries are made, protection is disabled. SMB accesses are not controlled via IP Sender Protection



How to configure e-mail or SNMP trap notifications?

Automatic error notification ensures possible system errors are instantly communicated to the administrator via email or SNMP Traps.

The ISD300 sends warnings and error messages via e-mail or SNMP traps to a recipient. The system administrator is automatically notified by the ISD300 if an error occurs on the ISD300. The notification level specifies which messages will be sent.

It is not necessary to delete the notification setup. The notification function can be switched of. Choose **Disabled** in the 'notification level' list box.

How to update Firmware or Software?

ISD300 can be updated, simply receiving new firmware or software via the network.

During a firmware update, the old firmware is overwritten and replaced. The configuration parameters retain their original settings.

The ISD300 comes with the current firmware and software, so that an update is generally only required as bugfix.

Proceed as follows:

- Choose Install software on the ISD300.

- 6. Select a firmware or software file.

How to create a Backup?

The system configuration can be stored in a backup file on another system. If required, the configuration then can be restored within seconds. This configuration can also be used to configure further ISD devices, to achieve consistent configuration and minimise installation times.

- Network settings, queues, drivers, users and access control
- Queues and drivers
- Drivers only

Proceed as follows:

- 1. Click **Maintenance**.
- 2. Click Software.
- 3. Choose Create backup on the ISD300.
- 4. Click Next.
- 5. Enable the desired check boxes.
- 6. Click Create.
- 7. Click **Download** to save the backup file on your client.
- 8. Click **Finish** to go back to the first page of the Software Manage Wizard.

How to reboot the ISD300?

The ISD300 must be rebooted after a firmware or software update, so that the update can take effect.

Proceed as follows:

- 1. Click **Maintenance**.
- 2 Click Reboot
- 3. Click Reboot.

How to install Software?

With the assistance of the Software Manage Wizard you can install filters or manuals on the ISD300.

How to delete Software?
